







Historical Partnership

- 1917 - Columbus petitions Army to establish a base, 1918 Camp Benning established
- 1952 – Fort Benning and Community establish a regional Civilian-Military Council; Model program
- Local and Regional Community Leadership committed to supporting Fort Benning and its soldiers
- Support of Army Community of Excellence and other Quality initiatives
- Communities offer to co-host dignitaries and special visitors
- 2004 – Army puts a pilot initiative in place, Fort Benning-Columbus Historic District Partnership


Regional Partnerships

Future of Fort Benning

- **Positive Growth is affected by:**
 - **Transformation – This Presentation** (6,000 soldiers)
 - 10 New Army Brigades (ie. 5th Bde, 25th Inf. Div)(Apr-Aug 06)
 - Other Unit Changes: Medical; Engineer; Ranger, etc.
 - School changes: IBCT, BOLC, OCS, Airborne, etc.
 - BRAC 2005 – Fall 2005 (est. 35+ Army bases to close)
 - Impact up to 40,000 soldiers; 20,000 civilian positions
 - Impact up to 30,000 airman; and civilian positions
 - Overseas Re-stationing back to U.S. – (To BRAC retained Bases)
 - European Forces (returning 50,000-60,000 troops, 100,000 family members, and civilian employees)
 - Pacific Forces: Korea and Japan (15,000+ current estimate)






Mission Sustainability-

Protect the Installations Missions from Regional Development

- Objective - Protect Fort Benning from Encroachment
- Political Support; Member on Policy Committee; Consider Recommendations
- Conduct Joint Land Use Study (JLUS)
 - DOD and Fort Benning desire this JLUS
 - DOD pays 75%
 - FBFP will pay remaining 25%


Figure 1: Historical and Projected Urban Growth Near Fort Benning, Georgia

Community Impact

- 65% married (expect this % to increase) ($6,000 \times .65 =$)
Spouses available for workforce **3,900**
- 1.8 children per family **7,020**
 - **75% estimated to be school age (pre K-12)** **5,265**
 - Tour Length 36 + 36 months (Increases Home Purchases)







MAJOR ROADS OF GEORGIA





Fall Line Freeway

CORRIDOR FACTS

- ◆ The corridor traverses the entire width of the state from the Alabama State Line at Columbus to Macon and then to Augusta at the South Carolina State Line.
- ◆ This corridor is approximately **215 miles** in length.
- ◆ Completed projects provide **4-lanes** of roadway, usually divided with a 44' wide grass median.
- ◆ There are approximately **170 miles (79%)** open to traffic or under construction.
- ◆ The current estimated cost to complete the 4-lane construction of the Fall Line Freeway is **\$255,500,000**.
- ◆ The section from Columbus to Macon is **100%** under construction or open to traffic.
- ◆ The section from Macon to Augusta is **66%** under construction or open to traffic.

The corridor through Columbus east to SR 96 in Geneva in Talbot County is located along US 80/ SR 22 and is 4-lanes and open to traffic. The corridor from Columbus east to SR 96 in Geneva in Talbot County is located along US 80/ SR 22 and is 4-lanes and open to traffic.

From SR240 in Geneva eastward to about one-half mile east of Junction City, the corridor is located along SR 96. This portion of the corridor is 4-lanes and open to traffic.



US 27

CORRIDOR FACTS

- ◆ The US 27 corridor traverses the entire western length of the state beginning in Chattanooga at the Tennessee State Line and continuing south through Rome, Carrollton, Columbus and Bainbridge at the Florida State Line
- ◆ Completed projects provide **4-lanes** of roadway, usually divided with a 44' wide grass median
- ◆ The US 27 corridor is approximately **352 miles** in length
- ◆ Approximately **281 miles (80%)** of the corridor is open to traffic or under construction
- ◆ The current estimated cost to complete the four-lane construction of the US 27 corridor is **\$347,000,000**




US 27 FROM SR 54 IN NORTHERN TROUP COUNTY
TO I-85 EAST OF LAGRANGE

From SR 54 in Troup County south to CR 673 the corridor is under construction and is scheduled for completion in December 2005. (**Construction Project No. EDS-27(122)**)


Environmental studies are underway on a new roadway connector from north of LaGrange at CR 673 south of Beech Creek eastward to I-185 and I-85 (**Project ID Nos. 362910-, 310730-**).

From I-85 in Troup County south through Columbus to the city of Cusseta in Chattahoochee County, the corridor is complete and open to traffic via I-185 and SR 520/US 280.

Utility Future



- Regional water and sewer concepts are being considered, with some implementation
- Excess capacity in water resource and waste water treatment capacity
- Capacity in electrical power and natural gas
- Redundant and modern telecommunications infrastructure
- Growing wireless network and capacity

 - Chattahoochee County (planning ongoing)
 - Marion County
 - Stewart County
 - Fort Benning-U.S. Army: \$7 Million upgrade 3-05

Georgia Partnership

- **Gov Perdue's 2005 Assistance (Cont.):**
 - Public Education
 - Muscogee County School District: QBE; Const \$15 million
 - Chattahoochee County School System
 - Harris County School System: Const \$500,000 portable Classrooms
 - Higher Education
 - Columbus State University; Teacher Certification; Law Enforcement Training; Health Care (BSN)
 - Columbus Technical College; Health Care; Construction Sciences/Trades; etc.

Alabama Partnership

- **Gov Riley has offered assistance – he is being asked for:**
 - Planning funds
 - Transportation Projects
(Designed to Open land for Residential Development)
 - Possible Hwy 165 Improvement
 - Possible new road from Hwy 165 to Hwy 431
 - Public Education (Schools)
 - Higher Education
 - Troy University – Teachers, etc; Possible Facility Assistance
 - CVCC – Healthcare, Construction, etc.
 - Water & Sewer Projects; Phenix City & Russell County & Smiths Station in Lee County are top priority


